Well known in the Southern Gospel Music Industry for their tight vocal blend and classic styling, The Melody Boys Quartet is committed to spreading the Gospel of Jesus Christ through song. When Gerald Williams joined the group in 1949 at age 16, the Stamps Baxter Melody Boys Quartet, with Smilin' Joe Roper, filled the radio airwaves three time daily. They also starred in their own nightly television show in their home state of Arkansas. In 1957 the Melody Boys Quartet performed at the very first National Quartet Convention in Memphis, Tennessee; and they continue to perform on the main stage of the National Quartet Convention, now located in Louisville, Kentucky, every year.

On October 12, 2006, Gerald was inducted into the Southern Gospel Music Hall of Fame in Dollywood of Pigeon Forge, Tennessee. Now in his 61st year singing bass for the The Melody Boys Quartet, his Hall of Fame induction distinguishes Gerald as one of Gospel Music's living legends. Beyond that, Gerald is respected throughout the Industry as a man of integrity with a true heart for God. Roy Pauley, of The Singing News Magazine, has said of Gerald, "He's without question today's most accomplished bass."

Today, the Melody Boys Quartet is formed by lead vocalist, Chris Walton, first tenor, Mike Franklin, Dean Porter singing baritone, and, of course, Gerald Williams on bass.

The driving force of the Melody Boys Quartet now, as then, is to "Give the World A Smile" as they devote their lives to sharing the Gospel in song.
